How "To Save A Life"

"Teens love movies. Help them be missional. Imagine your kids bringing their friends for a 7-week series based on a movie they want to see." – To Save A Life Website

Last May, Eric and I attended a youth workers training event where we got a sneak peek at a new movie called "To Save a Life." It was amazing! It is a powerful movie about the real-life challenges of teens and their choices. We've since discovered that is more than just a movie but that it can be a movement. There are curriculum and teen devotionals centered on the biblical concept that we're more like


Jesus when we're reaching out to the hurt and lonely. The writer of *To Save A Life* is Jim Britts who is a seasoned youth worker with a film degree from BIOLA University, and *To Save A Life* is a project inspired by a passion to reach teenagers with life-affirming entertainment—the kind of movie youth workers, parents and student leaders can get behind.

Teens too! Imagine them bringing friends to see the film... then bringing them back to a seven-week study at our church, growing in their faith and learning to reach out to others and asking the question: What's my life going to be about? Imagine the difference this effort can make!

So we are asking our members, and especially parents of teens, to get on board with this outreach. Currently we are scheduled to attend the movie on Sunday, January 24 in the afternoon. The only theater right now showing it is in Valley View. We encourage parents to invite other parents to attend this movie.

The most important thing all of us can do is pray for this event that teens' lives will be changed by seeing this movie. Pray that the Holy Spirit will move in the hearts of teens as they ask their friends to attend. We can all make a difference. We can all save a life.


Have you ever wondered why the season surrounding the holidays is called "Christmastide" or "Yuletide"? Regardless of the true meaning of those words, it very often places the image of someone drowning, being swept away by the tide of all this season brings.

Having just celebrated what many of us feel is the most beautiful time of the year, some of us may find it difficult to recognize when those around us are hurting. At this time of year, however, I think we need to be extra vigilant and extra aware of the pain and spiritual emptiness around us. We need to notice when a coworker is feeling a little down. We need to pay attention to the woman across the street that lost her mother, or husband, or a child in the last year. We need to notice the kid at school whose parents divorced a few months ago. "Christmastide" can be such a lonely and hopeless time for those who have experienced loss and those who already feel hopeless or alone.

As Christians, we have the ultimate hope. We have the comfort of the one who *never* leaves us. We need to come alongside those who are aching to know that comfort, to have that hope, and show them the love of God. He has seen fit to use us, broken vessels that we are, to demonstrate His love to the world. Through that demonstration, He can use us to offer the hurting hope. We can give them comfort. He can give them Jesus!


